

CIRCUIT OF THE WORLD'S HISTORY.

UNITED STATES.

The Democratic House and the Administration have done much to convince the country that it was a mistake to entrust them with power. The first session of the XLIXth Congress was a melancholy exhibition of legislative incompetence and folly. The Democratic House, with a majority of 43, had promised to reduce the current expenditures of the Government, to scale down the "war tariff" to "a peace basis" and to take off \$100,000,000 in taxes. That House was in session for eight months without accomplishing any of these objects. The rules were revised for the express purpose of expediting business and disciplining Mr. Randall; and after months had been wasted a secret caucus appointed a "steering" committee of three (Mr. Carlisle, Mr. Morrison, Mr. Randall) with absolute power over the course of legislation; yet nothing was done. In place of retrenchment, the House authorized increased expenditures. Its appropriations exceeded by \$69,062,744 those of 1883-'84 and by \$32,779,685 those of 1884-'85. There was neither reduction of taxes nor tariff revision. Two tariff bills, each hostile to the other, were brought in and neither was considered. On June 17 the House by a vote of 140 to 157 refused to go into Committee of the Whole and take up the Morrison Tariff bill, only 5 Republicans voting for it and 35 Democrats against it. After this defeat Mr. Morrison decided that there should be no legislation except appropriation bills. The amendments to the warehouse and customs administration laws were smothered. An attempt to abolish the duty on wool was defeated. The tariff was not touched.

The House, warned by the death of the Vice-President, consented to the passage of a Presidential Succession act, providing substitutes from the Cabinet for vacancies caused by the death, removal or disability of both President and Vice-President. It also adopted the Dingley Shipping bill with the Senate's amendments arming the President with retaliatory powers against the Canadian authorities. The Senate bill imposing a tax of two cents a pound on oleomargarine and butterine was approved, after stubborn resistance, 107 Republicans and 70 Democrats voting for it and 15 Republicans and 86 Democrats against it. An inadequate bill for the increase of the Navy was also passed, authorizing the construction of two double-bottomed armored vessels of 6,000 tons displacement, one protected cruiser of not less than 3,500 displacement, and a torpedo boat; providing for the completion of four double-turreted monitors, and appropriating \$2,500,000 for these purposes. These were positive results of eight months' legislation. The negative results, in addition to the failures already mentioned, were the House's neglect to make provision for coast defences and heavy ordnance,

notwithstanding Mr. Tilden's convincing arguments, or to pass the stringent laws against polygamy which the President had recommended and the Senate had approved; its refusal to listen to Dakota's appeal to be admitted to the Union, or to sanction bills for the regulation of Chinese immigration and the indemnification of Chinese sufferers by the Rock Springs riots; its substitution of a wild measure for a good scheme for regulating interstate commerce and the consequent defeat of the act passed by the Senate; its rejection of the Senate's Indian bills and the smothering of the Blair Education bill for aiding schools, especially in the South. Confronted with this startling record of inaction and incompetence, the House on reassembling in December has promptly passed a measure, long pending, for regulating the counting of electoral votes in Presidential elections.

The Administration has had very little political authority over the Legislature and has been repulsed whenever it has aspired to leadership. It asked for the stoppage of silver coinage. The House responded with a proposition for free and unlimited coinage, which was defeated only with Republican aid. All other currency and coinage measures which were proposed were hostile to the Administration. The Executive recommendations for tariff revision and for legislation against polygamy and in favor of generous appropriations for fortifications, heavy guns and a navy were either ignored or dealt with inadequately and grudgingly. The Administration's fisheries policy was condemned in both Houses. No financial measure was passed, except one for the issue of small silver notes on the same terms with silver certificates now outstanding. The House even went so far as to vote "want of confidence" in the Administration. The surplus resolution, proposed by Mr. Morrison and adopted July 14 with only twelve dissenting votes on the Democratic side, directed that, whenever the balance in the Treasury, including the amount held for redemption of United States notes, should exceed \$100,000,000, it should be the duty of the Secretary to apply such excess to the payment of the interest-bearing debt. The object of this arbitrary resolution was to force the speedy payment of United States bonds in 75-cent silver. It implied repudiation or else the adoption of a silver standard. This resolution depriving the Administration of all discretionary power was loaded down with amendments in the Senate and finally passed by the House as reported by a conference committee; but even in its modified form it did not receive the President's signature. The House, however, has given active support to the President's campaign against the pensioners of the Government. It has sustained nearly all his numerous vetoes of private pension bills. It refused to repeal the limitation on arrearages of pensions. It stood out for two days in a futile attempt to saddle every pension bill with a provision for an income tax. The President, for his part, has been equally considerate. While he vetoed 113 bills in eight months—all the Presidents before him from Washington's day had only vetoed 108—he did not veto the River and Harbor bill with its burden of \$15,000,000.

The Administration's chief success has been achieved in the administration of public finance. Secretary Manning, whose resignation happily was not accepted after a critical illness, has resisted all the worst tendencies of Democratic demagogues and repudiators and has proved a prudent and efficient financier. The Treasury statement of November 30 reported a nominal debt of \$1,715,507,808 03 and an actual indebtedness of \$1,452,544,766 56. The State Department has been well represented in England, where Mr. Phelps has succeeded in negotiating a new extradition treaty providing for the surrender of fugitive embezzlers and dynamite criminals. The necessity for an amended treaty has been emphasized during the year by an alarming number of embezzlements in Boston, Hartford, New-York and Western cities, and its ratification by the Senate is confidently expected. The negotiation of an extradition treaty with Japan—the first ever signed by an Asian State—is a development of the same policy. In other respects Secretary Bayard's diplomacy has been signally unsuccessful. He had allowed himself to be enticed by the British Minister into an agreement for prolonging the operation of the Fishery clauses of the Treaty of Washington and had taken strong ground in favor of an international commission for the settlement of questions at issue with Canada. This policy was opposed to the interests of the American fishing fleet and was condemned by the Senate. Reversion

to the Treaty of 1818 was accompanied by hostile demonstrations on the part of the Canadian Government, which carried on during the year relentless warfare upon American fishermen, seizing vessel after vessel for technical violations of the customs laws and repudiating the common obligations imposed by British and American commercial law. These outrages have given rise to a prolonged diplomatic correspondence in which the American case has been ably presented. The Secretary had, however, fatally compromised himself by premature declarations in favor of a new treaty, and he failed to discern the futility of negotiations and the necessity of employing the exceptional powers of retaliation on Canadian commerce with which Congress had armed the Administration. In marked contrast with the inaction and submissiveness displayed in dealing with Great Britain was the Secretary's noisy and precipitate championship of Cutting, an American living in Mexico and punished for a libel printed in Texas and circulated across the border. The prisoner was finally released as an act of international courtesy, after he had been sentenced by the Mexican courts. President Diaz in his annual message very properly accused Secretary Bayard of endangering the interests of peace by exaggerating the importance of a trivial incident and making arbitrary and unwarrantable demands upon a friendly Power.

President Cleveland's only popular act during the year has been his marriage. This occurred in the White House on June 2. His own party have been irritated by his dalliance with Civil Service reform, while his political opponents have ceased to respect a faint-hearted policy of ill-disguised shams and small pretences. The President's non-partisanship consists in the exclusive appointment of Democrats to office and in neglecting to turn out Republican officeholders as rapidly as party greed demands. What his Civil Service principles really are it is not easy to determine. He allowed the examining boards in New-York, Boston, Philadelphia, New-Orleans, Cincinnati and other cities to be reorganized in such a way as to nullify practical Civil Service reform. When an outcry was raised the Commission ordered that the Boards should not be controlled by the Collectors' deputies and private secretaries. As the elections approached the President issued an order warning office-holders not to take part in political contests. When violations of this order were so numerous as to excite ridicule, he suspended a Democrat and a Republican District-Attorney. The Democrat was subsequently reinstated on the score that he had not neglected public business while making political speeches. The Republican offered proof that he had not neglected his public duties, and was curtly reminded that he had made speeches that were hostile to the Administration. The absurdity of the situation was crowned with the exposure of the Democrat official's assaults from the stump upon Civil Service reform. The retention of Attorney-General Garland in the Cabinet and the support given by the Government to the ring of speculators who had been trafficking in his official position have reduced the President's devotion to Civil Service reform to a hollow mockery. The investigation ordered by the House, when influential Democratic journals had united with the Republican press in denouncing this public scandal, proved how well founded had been the charges made against Mr. Garland, Mr. Goode and officials of the Interior Department. Three reports were submitted (August 31), Chairman Boyle's being a partisan attempt to acquit all the officials implicated, Mr. Hale's an independent Democratic view, and Mr. Kanney's a crushing indictment of the telephone ring. The Senate declined to confirm Solicitor-General Goode's nomination. The Attorney-General remains in office, ruined in reputation and thoroughly discredited. The Government suit begun against the Bell Company has been thrown out of court in Ohio. The Pan-Electric was the chief Congressional investigation of the year, the Senate having decided by a vote of 44 to 17 not to take up the bribery charges against the Democratic caucus in Ohio which nominated Senator Payne.

The autumn elections disclosed a decided reaction against the Democratic party. The commonest features of the Democratic platforms adopted in various States were a demand for the reduction of the tariff to a revenue basis and hostility in one form or another to prohibitory and temperance legislation. The Republican conventions denounced the Morrison bill, advocated

protection to industries and workingmen and favored either the enforcement of existing laws or the enactment of more rigorous legislation against intemperance. The Anti Saloon movement, which culminated in the Chicago Convention on September 16, gave a strong impulse to the development of temperance principles in the Republican party. Mr. Blaine conducting the September canvass in Maine made protection the chief issue and exposed the hypocrisy and folly of the Prohibitionists of that State. The result was a striking Republican victory, Governor Bodwell's majority over Edwards being 12,619, with a Prohibition vote of 3 per cent. In Ohio the Republican majority was 11,781 with a Prohibition vote of 4 per cent. In Pennsylvania Mr. Blaine's inspiring canvass on behalf of protection was largely instrumental in giving Beaver 42,651 over Black, with the Prohibition vote 4 per cent of the whole. New-Jersey and New-York were held by the Democrats in November and the Republican majority in Massachusetts was cut down, but in the Congressional elections the party in power lost heavily. Speaker Carlisle's seat was imperilled by a labor candidate; Mr. Hurd was overwhelmingly defeated in Ohio; and Mr. Morrison was thrown out in Illinois. These free trade defeats coupled with the reduction of the Democratic majority in the House have given Republicans new courage. The 46th Congress, Lower House, now stands: Republicans, 151; Democrats, 168; Labor and Independent, 4; vacancies, 2. The Senate will have 39 Republicans and 37 Democrats, even if Indiana and New-Jersey elect Democrats. The Mayoralty contest in New-York City brought out an unexpectedly large vote for Henry George, the Labor candidate, and opened new contingencies and possibilities in American politics.

Organized labor has astonished the country with exhibitions of its political power without accomplishing any great results. In the countless industrial conflicts of the year it has alternately failed and succeeded. On the whole, the drawn battles and victories so far outnumber the defeats as to contribute a powerful impulse to labor movements. The number of local organizations of the Knights of Labor has rapidly increased and a federation of trades unions has also been established. What the labor movement conspicuously lacks is generalship. T. V. Powderly, the ablest leader the working classes have yet found, has lacked the ability requisite for harmonizing divisions of opinion in the great councils of the Knights of Labor and for preventing strikes until strenuous efforts have been made to effect settlements. He did not approve of the great strike in the Southwest, which grew out of so trivial a cause as the discharge of an official who was a member of the order; but he had to assume responsibility for it. A general strike was ordered on the Missouri Pacific Railway in order to force the receiver of another road, the Texas Pacific, to take back the discharged man. Traffic was blocked, business was paralyzed, officers of law were shot down, and scenes of bloodshed enacted in many States. Powderly finally ordered a stoppage of the strike, and Martin Irons and his sympathizers in the executive committee neglected to execute his command. Early in May, when this strike had ended in defeat, a general movement in favor of eight hours set in throughout the country, and strikes occurred in nearly all the leading trades and in many cities. This movement Powderly also condemned, but he was powerless to resist it. Business was obstructed, the terrors of boycotting were applied, and rioting and murder were instigated in Chicago, Milwaukee and elsewhere. The movement was not, however, generally supported by workingmen.

A band of foreign-born Anarchists took advantage of the opportunity afforded by these strikes. They had no real connection with the labor movements in Chicago, where they made a desperate attempt to create a panic and to win over the trades unions to their side. Seven policemen were killed and many bystanders wounded on May 4 by the bomb-throwers. This cowardly conspiracy created a powerful revulsion of feeling not only against Anarchists, but also against organized labor. Powderly redoubled his public protests and secret circulars against violence, lawlessness and dynamite crime. Terrorized communities began to defend themselves and to demand rigid enforcement of laws against boycotting and conspiracy. The Chicago Anarchists were speedily brought to trial and on August 20 seven of them were sentenced to death and one to imprisonment for life. The jury could not

discriminate in favor of murderers who styled themselves Socialists, reformers and friends of working people. They decided that an Anarchist is a murderer when he plots, instigates or commits murder by dynamite, and as a murderer he should be punished. A motion for a new trial was denied on October 7, but a temporary stay of proceedings has been granted.

These labor conflicts have continued throughout the year. In April and June the Lake Shore Railroad was blockaded; in July tanners, carriers, carpet-weavers and coal miners were on strike; in June, August and December there was a tie-up on the street-car lines in New-York and Brooklyn, and a disastrous strike came to naught on the Third Avenue Railroad; in October the Chicago packers went out; and from first to last business in every quarter of the country has been disordered in consequence of these and hundreds of similar uprisings. Powderly, the most prudent and conservative of the labor leaders, has contrived to keep himself in power while strenuously resisting the Hotspurs surrounding him. At the Cleveland Assembly of the Knights of Labor in June extremists were elected to the Executive Council and hostilities between the organization and the trades unions seemed imminent. At the Richmond Assembly in October Powderly was re-elected General Master Workman after his courageous stand taken on behalf of colored workmen. He has continued to denounce intemperance and Socialism and to exercise a restraining influence upon the organization, but is meeting with much bitter opposition. A collapse of the fortunes of this powerful order seems imminent.

The chief calamity of the year was the earthquake shock that was felt on the night of August 31 over nearly one-third of the United States. Charleston was terribly devastated by it, at least one-half of the buildings being either thrown down or seriously impaired. The earthquake followed a series of less destructive ones in Greece, Smyrna and the eastern Mediterranean. Something similar to earthquake upheavals has broken up the trend of New-York politics. The corruption of the Aldermanic Council has been disclosed in court, and two of the most flagrant offenders have been convicted. The corrupt ring under Maurice B. Flynn and Rollin M. Squire, which was the fitting supplement to the control of Hubert O. Thompson in the Public Works Department, has been broken up. Political conditions in the city, while far from satisfactory to the public, are now better than they have been during the recent years. This improvement is well-timed since the city has received during the year the unique gift from France of Bartholdi's colossal Liberty.

GREAT BRITAIN.

As usual it has been an Irish year in British politics, and it ends as it began with a Conservative Government shuffling between two policies and alternately conciliating and intimidating the island. At the outset the Salisbury Government were in a hopeless minority in the Commons. They could govern the country either by making sweeping concessions to their allies the Parnellites (Mr. Gladstone had confidentially informed them that he would support this policy), or by proposing the re-enactment of the Crimes Act and thereby securing the support of Moderate Liberals who were alarmed by Mr. Gladstone's conversion to Home Rule. They either could not or would not decide upon either policy. Their Viceroy, Lord Carnarvon, had himself been convinced of the necessity of legislative autonomy. His colleagues condemned his efforts as a peacemaker and forced him to resign on the eve of the reassembling of Parliament. The Queen's speech betokened coercion and a struggle with the National League. Then there was an interval of vacillation. Mr. Smith was appointed Chief Secretary and dispatched to Ireland to report on the necessity of legislation. After this display of indecision the Government suddenly announced a rigorous Coercion bill. Mr. Parnell at once abandoned his allies of the previous election. An

amendment proposed, by Mr. Collings, to the address expressed regret that no measure for the relief of the agricultural classes had been suggested and especially that facilities for obtaining allotments and small holdings on equitable terms had not been promised. This amendment was carried January 26, being supported by 255 Liberals and 74 Parnellites, with only 18 Moderate Liberals against it. The Salisbury Government immediately resigned.

The new Government was formed by a Prime Minister whose real Irish policy was an open secret. Without committing himself to a single definite proposition, Mr. Gladstone had contrived by various expedients to inspire the Parnellites with a belief that he was prepared to grant Home Rule. So profound were the apprehensions of the Moderate Liberals that their leaders, Lord Hartington and Sir Henry James, declined to enter the Ministry. Lord Spencer became a member of it, having become convinced that Home Rule was necessary. Mr. Morley's appointment as Chief Secretary for Ireland was a clear indication of what Mr. Gladstone's policy was to be, but Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Trevelyan failed to interpret it aright and took office greatly to the astonishment of their friends. Lord Rosebery went to the Foreign and Lord Granville to the Colonial Office; Sir William Harcourt accepted the Chancellorship of the Exchequer; and the remaining seats in the Cabinet were distributed among former Liberal Ministers. No sooner was the Cabinet formed than rumors of resignations were started. Mr. Gladstone had to propose a final settlement of the land question before he could hope to induce his colleagues to acquiesce in Home Rule. If he had neglected to do this, Lord Spencer and Mr. Morley would have retired. But when he brought forward a scheme for land purchase at the expense of the Exchequer, Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Trevelyan were alarmed by the bill of cost. After protracted attempts to unite the Cabinet on the question of Home Rule and land purchase, these two Ministers resigned, their places being filled by Mr. Stansfeld and Lord Dalhousie. The secession of the Radical leader betokened the ultimate failure of Mr. Gladstone's Irish measures.

The Home Rule bill was introduced April 8. The Prime Minister justified his measure mainly on the ground that British law in Ireland had an alien aspect and that it was necessary, coercion having repeatedly failed, to put legislation and administration in Irish hands in order to inspire national confidence. The legislature which he proposed was to consist of 206 Commons and a higher order of 103 members, including twenty-eight representative Irish peers and seventy-five associates elected with a high property qualification. Ireland was not to be represented at Westminster; and its own legislature was to be prohibited from establishing any religion or interfering with the army and navy, customs, excise, coinage, legal tender, or any of the prerogatives of the Crown. The bill was read for the first time after hostile speeches from Mr. Trevelyan, Mr. Goschen, Mr. Chamberlain, and Lord Hartington. The Land Purchase bill was then introduced. The debate on the second reading of the Home Rule bill was protracted until June 10. Public meetings in opposition to Mr. Gladstone's measures were held in many cities, and a powerful body of Liberals under Lord Hartington and Mr. Chamberlain arrayed themselves against it. Meetings of the National Liberal Association and of Liberal associations throughout England and Scotland were held for the purpose of uniting the party in support of Home Rule and of influencing waverers in Parliament. As the final division approached Mr. Gladstone called a conference of the party, and Mr. Labouchere undertook to effect a compromise whereby the bill could be read a second time. The waverers, invigorated by the firm stand taken by Lord Hartington, the logical speeches of Mr. Goschen and the passionate entreaties of Mr. Bright, went against the Government. The Home Rule bill was defeated by a vote of 343 to 313, with only thirteen members absent from the division. The number of Liberals voting against Mr. Gladstone was ninety-three. Mr. Parnell and the Irish members had heartily supported the proposed measure.

The Government brought the session to a close as soon as various bills for supply could be passed and then appealed to the country. The elections were not concluded until July 26. The Conservatives agreed to support all Liberals who had voted against the Home Rule bill, and stipulated in return

that no Liberal-Unionist should be nominated against their own candidates. This alliance supported, as it was, by an ample election fund, proved too powerful for Mr. Gladstone, ably seconded as he was by Mr. Parnell, who made a personal canvass of English cities. He spoke with great effect in Edinburgh, Manchester and Liverpool, but conducted the canvass almost single-handed, his colleagues, with the exception of Lord Spencer and Mr. Morley, rendering slight assistance. His appeal to the masses against the classes failed to excite enthusiasm. If the costly land purchase bill had not been proposed as an essential portion of his scheme English democracy might have rallied to his support. As it was he secured only 191 seats, which with the eighty-six Irish seats left him in a minority. The Liberal Unionists carried seventy-eight seats. The Conservatives, while making great gains and obtaining 315 seats, lacked a clear majority of the House. The Irish delegation remained unchanged, two seats being gained in Londonderry and West Belfast, and as many lost in South Londonderry and South Tyrone.

Lord Salisbury returned to power after unavailing efforts had been made to induce Lord Hartington to form a Unionist ministry. Lord Randolph Churchill again contrived to thrust his rivals aside and to obtain the leadership of the House and the Chancellorship of the Exchequer. He also carried into the Home Office Mr. Matthews, whose assault upon Sir Charles Dilke in the Crawford divorce case and success in contesting Birmingham had made him a conspicuous figure in Tory politics. The new Cabinet was substantially a repetition of the previous one formed by Lord Salisbury, with the exceptions noted and with Lord Iddesleigh in the Foreign Office and Sir Richard Cross in the India Office. During the autumn session financial business alone was transacted. Mr. Parnell was allowed to introduce a bill for the suspension of evictions, but it was defeated by a great majority, although Mr. Gladstone had supported it. Lord Randolph Churchill's success in leading the House was unmistakable and the session closed with the alliance between the Liberal Unionists and Conservatives unbroken. He subsequently displayed courage and discernment of political forces in giving support to Austria against Russia in Southeastern Europe and in incorporating in the Conservative programme nearly all the characteristic measures of the Liberal party except Home Rule. The Liberal party itself remains hopelessly divided. The conference of the Gladstonians at Leeds early in November decided that it was as impossible as it would be dishonorable to abandon Home Rule. The Liberal Unionists meeting in London a month later resolved to maintain their organization and to oppose Home Rule to the bitter end.

The Irish people have maintained their self-command throughout this trying year. With the exception of the riots in Belfast, which followed the general elections, the country has remained in a state of profound peace. The exceptionally low prices of farm produce have induced general distress and the league plan of campaign has met with general approval since the defeat of Mr. Parnell's bill for preventing evictions. Tenants who could not pay their full rents were advised to offer their landlords reduced rents and if these were refused, to pay them to representatives of the league as trustees. The Government after winking at these proposals for weeks suddenly pronounced them illegal, prosecuted Mr. Dillon and other leaders, and distinctly threatened to enforce existing laws, to make an issue between the Crown and the league and to bring in a rigorous Coercion bill. Almost as soon as a firm policy was adopted the scene suddenly shifted. Lord Randolph Churchill, the only real leader the Tories have, resigned in consequence of the high estimates of the War Office and the Admiralty. This unexpected stroke has apparently given the island a reprieve from coercion and increased the chances of a speedy settlement of the question of Home Rule. It has weakened the Unionist alliance and drawn from Mr. Chamberlain overtures for a reunion of the Liberal party. It has multiplied the difficulties of enacting coercive legislation without which Ireland will continue to be governed by the National League. It has strengthened Mr. Gladstone's political authority as the only statesman who has proposed a settlement of the Irish question that Mr. Parnell has agreed to accept as final.

Lord Dufferin announced in January that the income tax would have to

be increased in India and other burdens imposed in consequence of the preparations for the defence of Afghanistan and the expenses of the war in Burmah. In Afghanistan there was a futile rising against the Ameer during November. Military operations have been renewed in Burmah since its annexation and are still in progress. The garrison there consists of 25,000 troops and 7,000 military police.

In Egypt 14,000 British troops are still retained as an army of occupation and each new Foreign Minister evades the question of evacuating the country. One-third of the garrison of Assouan was disabled by the heat during the summer. The Sultan was urged by Sir Drummond Wolff to assume responsibility for the government of the Soudan, but declined to do so. The Turkish and English Commissioners have not reached any decision respecting Lower Egypt. The deserts to the south are left to govern themselves. Emin Bey, one of Gordon's former subordinates, is holding out bravely at Gondokoro against a horde of blacks. Stanley is to head an expedition for his relief.

Zululand is to be divided between the Boers and the native races. The Boers taking the Western half are to form a free republic. The Zulus under English protection are to hold the Eastern half. This is the policy of the present Colonial Secretary.

In New-South Wales, where free trade has uniformly prevailed, the growth of protection ideas is becoming marked. In New Zealand a most destructive volcanic eruption occurred on June 10.

The completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been the chief event in the Dominion. This great line, which has involved vast financial outlay, was opened on June 28. Sir John Macdonald's government is approaching the close of its term and preparations for general elections cannot long be deferred. Dissatisfaction with the confederation scheme has broken out afresh in the maritime provinces. In Nova Scotia the party in favor of separation gained a decisive victory in June. In Ontario the provincial elections have gone against the Conservative party.

RUSSIA AND THE BALKAN.

Russia has been alternately irresolute and reckless in foreign policy. Prince Alexander's military successes enabled him to act independently of the St. Petersburg Foreign Office. He opened negotiations with Belgrade, Bukharest and Athens, and entered into a defensive alliance with the Porte. The Sultan early in February appointed him Governor-General of Eastern Rumelia, with authority to modify the laws of the province. The Prince in return for this concession promised to place his army at the disposal of the Porte. Bulgaria, which had been designed to be a Russian bridge on the road to Constantinople, was converted into a Turkish bulwark. The two provinces were united under a soldier prince, who could lead armies and make successful overtures for the federation of the Balkan States. The situation, from the Russian point of view, was intolerable.

M. de Giers's chief object was to keep the Eastern question open at all hazards and to watch for an opportunity for Russian military intervention. Accordingly, while he had induced the Powers to send early in January a summons for the disarmament of Servia, Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey, he secretly encouraged each State to resist coercion. He proposed that the request to disarm should be enforced. As Austria would not occupy Belgrade, Russia could not send an army into Bulgaria; but Greece was peremptorily warned that there must be no campaign against Turkey. Premier Delyannis, who was responsible for the Maritime Kingdom's costly preparations for war, defiantly refused to order disarmament. King Milan in like manner called out the Servian reserves; the Porte continued to transport regiments to Macedonia; and Prince Alexander not only demanded

that his appointment as Governor of Rumelia should be for life, but also arrested numerous Russian agents in Bulgaria who were plotting against him. The Powers decided early in April that the Prince's Rumelian term must be reduced to five years and he reluctantly signed the convention. Peace between Bulgaria and Servia had already been concluded. The Greek Premier, secretly encouraged by Russia and snatching at the hope of French mediation, refused to yield and challenged the Powers to do their worst. Nine ironclads belonging to England, Austria and Italy entered the Piræus, and a blockade of the coast was threatened. Delyannis, having failed to saddle upon King George the responsibility of deciding between peace and war, convoked the Chambers and retired from office. The Chambers meeting May 19 condemned his policy and ordered a disarmament. The treasury had been depleted and the population kept under tension of constant excitement for many months; and nothing had been accomplished. Delyannis had miscalculated the chances of European war.

The processes of M. de Giers's diplomacy were too slow to suit the impetuous temper of the Czar. He assumed personal control of the Bulgarian question about the time of Delyannis's surrender. He visited Sebastopol and issued an order to the fleet that was interpreted throughout Europe as a menace of war. Naval preparations in the Black Sea were accompanied by the massing of a large army in Bessarabia. The liberation of Russian officers arrested in Bulgaria for conspiracy was peremptorily demanded. The Porte was warned against the consequence of its alliance with Prince Alexander. Every Russian consulate in the Balkan became a centre of disaffection and treason. Finally, on August 21, Prince Alexander was seized in his palace by venal soldiers, hurried to the Danube and transported to Russian territory. Proclamations were issued announcing that he had ceased to reign and that Provisional Government had been established. Within forty-eight hours this government was overthrown, the army having declared everywhere in favor of the Prince. The coup d'état proved to be wholly destitute of popular support. The Prince having been released at Reui returned to his capital on September 4 and made his submission to the Czar in a message couched in the humblest language. The Czar instead of complying with the Prince's request to send Prince Doigoroutki on a mission of pacification vented his anger and spite in a most insulting reply. After this exhibition of imperial anger the Prince, who had been most cordially received by his people, announced his abdication. On September 7 he retired from the capital after naming three Regents. The Czar's brutal policy had triumphed.

An organized system of intimidation succeeded these acts of diplomatic brigandage. General Kaulbars, who was sent to Sophia as the Czar's personal agent, demanded the release of Prince Alexander's kidnappers, the abrogation of martial law and the postponement of the elections. He assumed the tone of a military dictator, bullied the Regents, telegraphed orders to commanders of garrisons, issued arbitrary proclamations, and addressed insulting speeches to Bulgarian audiences. The general elections were held during October in spite of his remonstrances and resulted in the return of 530 Nationalists and fifty Russian delegates. Not disconcerted by this defeat General Kaulbars renewed his arbitrary demands for the release of prisoners and ordered gunboats to Varna on the plea that the Russian Consulate was in need of protection. The Regents liberated seventy officers accused of mutiny and offered to restore Zankoff, the Russian leader, to office. Military occupation, which had apparently been contemplated, was deferred in consequence of the firm tone of Austrian diplomacy. The Sobranje, perceiving signs of hesitation on the part of Russia, elected Prince Waldemar of Denmark to the vacant throne. The Prince immediately declined the crown, and Russia, being pressed by Germany to name a candidate, elected Prince Nicholas of Mingreia. The Sobranje being unwilling to elect a Russian puppet appointed a commission to visit the European capitals. A fresh mutiny occurring in Bourgas, General Kaulbars promptly demanded the release of the ringleaders. The patience of the Regents and the temper of the Bulgarian mob had been sorely tried when in November not only the general but every diplomatic consular official was recalled to Russia. Diplomatic communications with Bulgaria were contemptuously declared to

be at an end. The Czar had either recoiled from his campaign of insolent aggression because he was brought face to face with a European coalition, or he had withdrawn his agent in a spasm of blind rage, having determined to occupy Bulgaria in the spring, even if he should be forced to fight Austria and renew demonstrations against Afghanistan. The offer of the throne to Prince Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg has not been favored in St. Petersburg.

The completion of the Trans-Caspian Railway to Merv enables Russia to concentrate a large force at a day's notice on the border of Western Afghanistan. The boundary question is apparently kept open for a deliberate purpose, although the surveys have been completed by the joint commission. A dispute has arisen respecting Khoja Saleh, which the Russian Foreign Office is not anxious to settle. Batum, which the Czar promised in the Treaty of Berlin should be a free port, has been closed against European commerce, and will probably be strongly fortified.

GERMANY AND AUSTRIA.

Military preparations and pacific diplomacy have been characteristic features of German policy during the year. The improved Mauser rifle, holding ten cartridges in the stock, has been rapidly introduced. One-half of the army is already provided with the new weapon. The Reichstag on reassembling November 2 received a proposal for raising the active army from 427,000 to 468,000 men for seven years beginning with 1887. This large increase is to include as many as twenty-four new batteries of artillery. The pretext for additional armament is the increase of the French army. The Committee on Military Affairs has voted against this large addition to the standing army although Count von Moltke has argued for it on the ground of urgent necessity. The Reichstag will probably sanction the proposals.

The Foreign Office while pleading a lack of interest in questions arising in Southeastern Europe has successfully intervened between Russia and Austria on behalf of peace. Prince Bismarck, while acquiescing in the dethronement of Prince Alexander and acknowledging the Czar's right to nominate a successor, has supported Austria's firm resistance to Russian encroachment upon the liberties of the Balkan nationalities. The angry, resentful and hot-headed Czar has been spared humiliating sacrifices of pride and honor, yet has been effectually kept under the restraints of European opinion. The conversion of Bulgaria into a Russian satrapy has been prevented. The transfer of Count Hatzfeldt to the German Embassy in England has enabled Prince Bismarck to place his son, Count Herbert Bismarck, at the head of the Foreign Office. This is a satisfactory arrangement in one respect, since the present Foreign Secretary will not stand in dread of the Chancellor's jealousy.

German support has given Austria a commanding position in the diplomacy of the Eastern question. Her influence in Serbia has remained unimpaired; Bosnia and the Herzegovina have been wisely governed and more closely incorporated with the protecting State; and Bulgaria and Rumania have been dealt with sympathetically and encouraged to plan a Balkan confederation. Herr Tisza's speech in the Hungarian Parliament during the autumn marked the turning point of the diplomacy of the year. Disclaiming any covetous designs upon Balkan territory, he remonstrated firmly against the exercise of a preponderating influence there by any other Power and advocated the federation of autonomous States. This speech, followed by Count Kalnoky's more diplomatic explanations of foreign policy, dispelled the suspicion that there was a secret understanding between the two courts by which Russia was to take Constantinople and Austria Salonica. At the same time the delegations have been required to vote

largely increased military budgets and to sanction the strengthening of the artillery and the introduction of improved repeating rifles on a large scale.

Prince Bismarck's pacific diplomacy has extended to ecclesiastical affairs. In the Prussian House of Lords he announced in April an unequivocal abandonment of the May laws. An ecclesiastical bill had been introduced in February and amended by a Roman Catholic bishop; and after diplomatic negotiations between Berlin and the Vatican a series of clauses in the May laws were rescinded by the Landtag. The Chancellor's speech announcing that he had come to terms with the Pope was an unscrupulous attempt to foist the responsibility for the May laws upon General von Roon and Dr. Falk. The abandonment of the Culturkampf marks the most decisive defeat the Prime Chancellor has met with during his victorious career. In domestic legislation he has been signally unfortunate during the year. Only three members of the Reichstag voted for his project of a brandy monopoly; and a subsequent measure combining a new excise law and higher taxes on spirits was also laid aside through the opposition of Conservatives. Bills were passed for the establishment of three great canals connecting the Spree and the Oder, the Elms and the Rhine and the Baltic with the North Sea. The Government measures for expelling the Poles from Eastern Prussia were approved by the Prussian Chamber (January 30) by a vote of 264 to 153. Prince Bismarck justified the rooting-out of 35,000 landholders and workmen on the plea that the Poles did not belong on German soil and were a source of weakness and sedition. By the purchase of their farms the Government is enabled to plant a German population in their place. The agricultural proprietors throughout Germany have been clamoring for higher duties on corn and there are many signs of exhaustion under the tremendous strain of military expenses. Wages are low; times are hard, and the population increases 400,000 a year, although 200,000 emigrants are sent abroad. Colonial experiments have not been energetically followed up during the year, but two international lines of steamers to Eastern Asia and Australia, subsidized by the Government, have been established. A growing desire for the development of German colonies in South America is manifested.

The most dramatic event of the year has been the abdication and suicide of King Louis of Bavaria. His extravagant building enterprises, by which he had embarrassed the treasury and exposed the State to litigation for royal debts, led to the establishment of a regency on the ground of insanity. The King was taken to Castle Berg, on Lake Starnberg, under the care of a famous alienist. There he drowned himself in company with the physician, who had been overpowered in the water while attempting to rescue him.

FRANCE.

France is still without real leaders. M. De Freycinet's Premiership, begun early in the year, came to an end in December, when M. Goblet, his Minister of Education, succeeded him and reorganized the Ministry. From the outset he was as powerless as M. Ferry had been to control the Republican groups. Hardly was the Ministry formed before it was defeated on the question of amnesty; from time to time various members of it tendered their resignations in consequence of Radical demonstrations; and the Finance Minister, M. Carnot, was unable to have his Budget recommendations acted upon. President Grévy, who entered upon his second term on January 31, has been as limp an executive as ever. The Right, while numbering over one-third of the Deputies, have been without a leader. Even the Count of Paris, to whom the Revolutionary factions look for guidance, makes as grave mistakes in exile as Ministers do in office. In the absence of real leaders General Boulanger has succeeded in making himself a political personage by appeal-

ing to the pride of army officers and to the sense of comfort of the soldiers. The popularity of this indefatigable Minister of War has survived his conviction of mendacity by the Duc d'Aumale. It is due in part to real ability displayed by him in reorganizing the War Office and the military system, but largely to the pains he has taken to make life less burdensome to the soldiers. He has given them more comfortable beds in barracks, enabled them to wear beards and to drop knapsacks, abolished Sunday drills and parades and allowed them more holidays. He has founded a military club for the officers, improved the discipline and in various ways added to the prestige of the army. For the first time in a decade the annual manoeuvres have attracted general attention of military critics in Europe. Great masses of war material, moreover, have been collected and energy pervades every department of the army.

The expulsion of the heads of families which have reigned in France was ordered by the Deputies soon after the betrothal of the Crown Prince of Portugal to Princess Amélie, daughter of the Comte de Paris. The bill, which passed the Senate June 22, by a vote of 138 to 122, authorized the Government to expel other members of those families. It was immediately enforced against Prince Napoleon and his son Victor, who took refuge in Switzerland, and also against the Comte de Paris. The Orleans leader lost no time in justifying the action of the Government, which had not been heartily favored by the Republican groups. He issued a manifesto, openly avowing himself to be the rightful sovereign. "The Republic is afraid!" he wrote. "In striking at me it gives me prominence. I have confidence in France. At the decisive hour I shall appear." This manifesto deprived the Royalist leader of public sympathy, and vindicated the judgment of the Republican Government. An address issued later in the year and a futile attempt on his part to repudiate contracts made for local improvements at Eu and Tréport deepened the unfavorable impression formed of the pretender. General Boulanger did not hesitate to enforce the new law against the Duc d'Aumale, whose name was dropped from the army list. Expulsion immediately followed the indignant protest sent by him to President Grévy. He had a magnificent revenge a few weeks afterward, when he published that portion of his will bequeathing Chantilly, with its library and art collections, to the Institute for the use of France. This prospective gift to the Nation of an estate worth \$8,000,000 has done much to retrieve the blunders of the Comte de Paris.

M. de Freycinet abandoned the spirited colonial policy which had proved so unpopular, and sent M. Paul Bert to Hué as resident charged with the duty of making concessions to the natives and of reducing the garrison of 10,000 men. This temporizing policy has been fairly successful there and also in Madagascar. In European diplomacy France has taken a subordinate part. It is only in dealing with the Vatican that the Foreign Office displays vigor and recklessness. When the Pope appointed a Nuncio and Legate to Pekin, the Premier compelled him to rescind the orders for their departure by threatening to stop the pay of the clergy. Legislation against the interests of the Church was constantly proposed. A cremation bill, a civil-burials measure and an act prohibiting persons belonging to religious orders to teach in the State schools were passed. The last measure deprived 10,000 monks and nuns of employment. The Paris municipality carried the spirit of intolerance to the length of expelling nursing sisters from the hospitals. The rapidly increasing deficits of the budgets indicate that the time is close at hand when the separation of Church and State shall be decreed. M. Carnot reported in March a floating debt of \$300,000,000, which he proposed to fund by a loan, raising the National debt to \$5,000,000,000. The interest on the increased debt he suggested should be met by adding one-quarter to the spirit duty. The Budget Committee wasted six months in revising these figures and recasting the proposals, and finally recommended an income tax, for which the Finance Department insisted that a year's preparation was needed. - This incapacity of the Government and Legislature to deal successfully with questions of financial administration is impairing the prestige of republican institutions.

The August elections for the Councils-General did not disclose any material change in the relations of parties. Low prices of produce, however, coupled

with high taxes are adding to the feeling of National disquiet. The debt has been enormously increased, yet there has been no war on a grand scale, and the country has not regained its prestige in Europe. If republican government could only be economically conducted and ministries of greater stability could be established, France would be reassured. As it is there is uneasiness everywhere and a suspicion that a counter-revolution will come unless the process of national exhaustion can be arrested.

ITALY AND THE VATICAN.

Italy, not to be outdone by the other great Powers, has been increasing its armaments, introducing the new repeating rifle and ordering heavier guns for the fleet. The year has been one of unusual tranquillity in domestic politics. The Italian foreign policy has been intelligently directed by Count Robilant, who has been outspoken in regretting the deposition of Prince Alexander and very explicit in supporting Austria against Russia in southeastern Europe, and England against France in Egypt. The emigration of Italians to South America continues on a very large scale, and threatens to modify the relations of colonizing forces in that quarter of the world.

Leo XIII. continues to have remarkable success in dealing with foreign Governments. The moderation of his policy, the flexibility of his methods and his discernment of practical ends to be accomplished are the secrets of his power. He accepts every form of government and tolerates every phase of public opinion so long as spiritual teaching is not imperilled. In Ireland the Vatican has assumed responsibility for the Nationalist movement; the Primate is almost as powerful a Home Ruler as Mr. Parnell; and the clergy are in sympathy with the agrarian wrongs of the classes from which they are mainly recruited. In Spain the Pope has sanctioned the Regency and accommodated himself to the political conditions. Premier Sagasta announced in June that the Liberal party had ceased to distrust the clergy and was willing to put them in charge of the State's educational interests. In Belgium the moderation of the Vatican's policy has strengthened the Catholic party in the elections of the year. In Germany the Chancellor has pronounced Leo XIII. a statesmanlike Pope and agreed to abolish the May laws. In the negotiations with Berlin the Vatican has not given up anything. Prince Bismarck has made a complete surrender. Everywhere except in France the Vatican has made positive gains; and even there it would consent to look favorably upon existing institutions if it could be secured against persecution and anti-religious fanaticism. In Italy itself there has been no marked change in the relations of Church and State, although the Pope has inveighed bitterly against Government interference with his ancient prerogatives.

MINOR EUROPEAN STATES.

A child was born to the Queen of Spain on May 17 and welcomed with popular rejoicings as the heir to the throne. From birth he has been known as Alfonso XIII. The Regency has steadily increased in popularity. A military insurrection in Madrid, instigated by Zorilla's partisans, was easily suppressed. General Villacampa and five ringleaders were tried by court-martial and condemned to death, but the Queen-Regent commuted the sentence. The rank of Sergeant was abolished on October 28, when 1,300 of these officers were sent to the reserves with the privilege of entering the

officers' school. Sergeants have been prominent in all recent military insurrections. The elections in June resulted favorably for Premier Sagasta.

In Belgium the Catholic party, which was placed in power by the elections of 1884 in five provinces, has been strengthened by similar contests in the remaining provinces. The majority for the Government has risen from 34 to 56. Serious labor riots have occurred, and the Ministry have given employment to large bodies of men on public works.
