

THE SWARTWOUT LINEAGE.

Brevet Brigadier-General Leavenworth, March 21 to July 21, 1834; at the Military Academy at West Point, 1836-42; as assistant instructor of artillery, May 4 to July 21, 1836; as assistant-instructor of infantry tactics, July 21, 1836, to May 18, 1837, and as quartermaster, May 18, 1837, to September 1, 1842; in the Florida war, 1842; in garrison at Fort Stansbury, Florida, 1842-43; Jefferson Barracks, Mo., 1843-44; Fort Columbus, N. Y., 1844-45; and Fort Adams, R. I., 1845-46; in the war with Mexico, 1846-47; at Reinoso, 1846; and was engaged in the siege of Vera Cruz, March 9-29, 1847; on recruiting service, 1847-48; in garrison at Fort Macon, N. C., 1848-49; in Florida hostilities against the Seminole Indians, 1850; in garrison at Castle Pinckney, S. C., 1851-52; and in Florida hostilities against the Seminole Indians, 1852. His son, Henry Alden, died in Galveston, Texas, in 1867; Margaret Elizabeth died in Jefferson Barracks, Mo.; Mary died unmarried in Meadville, Pa.; Robert died unmarried in Stamford, Conn.

CCCLXVIII. Robert, son of Robert and Margaret B. Dunscomb Swartwout, born in New York city, on April 10, 1815, married, in Troy, N. Y., on August 13, 1839, Sarah Stearns, daughter of Samuel and Joanna Ketchum Satterlee of New York city, born there on August 30, 1816. He died in Stamford, Connecticut, on January 27, 1898.

Memoranda. Robert Swartwout engaged in business in New York city, in 1839, as a member of the firm of Swartwout & Satterlee, commission merchants, 56 Courtland Street; from 1856 to 1867 he was merchandising in Water Street, and dealt largely in rice, having a mill, known as the New York Rice Mill, on the corner of Jefferson and South streets. In 1870, he retired from business. Subsequently, as a resident of Stamford, Connecticut, he served from 1872 to 1891 (excepting the years 1881, 1887, 1888, 1889, and 1890)—fifteen years—as warden of the borough, and as the treasurer of the town, sixteen years, 1877-79 and 1881-93. His father, General Robert Swartwout, whose distinguished services in the War of 1812-15 have been related, was, in 1820-23, navy agent at the port of New York; and in 1842-43, and 1845, measurer in the custom-house.

CCCLXXI. John, son of Robert and Margaret B. Dunscomb Swartwout, born in the city of New York, in February, 1821, married at West Point, N. Y., in 1858, Mary, daughter of Claudius Berard, instructor in French in the United States Military Academy, and Mary Nichols Berard, born at West Point.

CCCLXXIII. Mary Colden, daughter of Samuel and Alice Ann Cooper Swartwout, born in October, 1820, married in New York city, on May 30, 1842, Montgomery, son of Robert L. and Margaret Livingston, born on August 31, 1816, and died at Clermont on the Hudson, on August 9, 1855. She married second Cleimont, son of Edward P. and Elizabeth Livingston, born on September 4, 1817. His first wife was Cornelia, daughter of Herman Livingston, of Oak Hill on the Hudson, who bore him two children. They were married at Oak Hill on October 8, 1844. His third wife was Ann A. Clarkson. He died at Clermont, near Tivoli, Columbia County, N. Y., on November 4, 1895. Mary Colden Livingston died without offspring, in New York city, on February 13, 1864.
