7. **SAMUEL RHODES'** widow, 1889, lived at Roscrea. Two of her sons and two daughters live near Dublin.

8. **RICHARD F. RHODES,** son of Samuel, 1798, is carrying on the old business, Main street, Roscrea.

9. **THOMAS RHODES** resides at 29 Highfield Road, Rathgar, County Dublin. He writes, December 10, 1897: "None of the descendants of William D. Rhodes ever did anything worth recording, that I know of—always been honest, hard working traders. None of them ever became conspicuous or joined any of the professions, except a cousin, an M. D., now in Australia. For generations they have have been spoken of as *Very Honest Men.*"
