

Aaron Alvord was a soldier in the French War, in Capt. Hitchcock's Company. "They were out eight months, from Apr. 3, 1735 to Jan. 3, 1756. They were in the battle near the southern extremity of Lake George, with Baron Dieskau."

Mar. 23, 1759, Noah Alvord of Springfield, Yeoman, in consideration of 80£, conveyed to Aaron Alvord of Springfield, "part of my homelot on the east side of Conn. River in Springfield—Dwelling house, barn, orchard thereon standing; bounded by land given by deed to my son Moses Alvord," etc.

Aaron Alvord and his wife Orpha sold property in Wilbraham, Mass., in 1776 and probably moved to Amherst soon after, as he was living there in 1781. An Aaron Alvord and wife were living at Hanover, N. H., in 1790. (U. S. census.)

Rev. War Service: "Alvord, Aaron, iWilbraham, Sergeant, Capt. James Warriner's Co. which marched on the alarm of Apr. 19, 1775; service 10 days." (Mass. Soldiers in Rev.)

ELIAB ALVORD (*Ebeneser, Ebeneser, Alexander*), born Northampton, Mass., Sept. 4, 1755; died Westhampton, Mass., Feb. 18, 1841; married 1st, May 10, 1794, Naomi Ingram of Hatfield, Mass., daughter of John and Thankful (Rose) Ingram. She died Westhampton, Mass., Aug. or Sept., 1802. He married 2nd, Northampton, Mass., June 12, 1806, Mrs. Dorothy (Clark) Parsons, widow of Joseph Parsons, Jr., and daughter of Joel and Martha (Kingsley) Clark. She was bapt. Northampton, Mass., June 14, 1761; died Westhampton, Mass., Feb. 26, 1832. Res. Westhampton, Mass.

Eliab Alvord and Thomas Alvord, both of Hatfield, Mass., in consideration of two hundred pounds, conveyed the home-lot on which "we now dwell" to Frederic Chapin of Hatfield, sadler. Deed dated Apr. 18, 1786. He resided in Westhampton on the present Dea. William Edward's place.

Sylvester Judd's interview with Eliab Alvord, aged 80, Oct. 21, 1835:

"Alvord says his father (mother dead) and family removed to Hatfield in 1777. The old Alvord homelot in Hatfield was sixteen rods wide and six or seven acres. House was one story and two rooms only; sold it in 1786 for two hundred and eighteen pounds and removed to Westhampton in the Fall
