479. NATHANIEL CLARKE ALVORD (*Elijah, Nathan, John, Thomas, Alexander*), born Greenfield, Mass., Jan. 1, 1804; died Trenton, Mich., Sept. 22, 1887; married 1st, Le Roy, N. Y., Oct. 6, 1827, Ann Churchill, daughter of John and Ruhama (Orton) Churchill. She was born in New Berlin, N. Y., Aug. 28, 1809; died Grosse Isle, Mich., Jan. 16, 1845. He married 2nd, Grosse Isle, Mich., Oct. 7, 1845, Sarah Ann (Churchill) Coon, widow of James Coon, and daughter of John and Ruhama (Orton) Churchill. She was born New Berlin, N. Y., July 27, 1815; died Trenton, Mich., Aug. 21, 1850. He married 3rd, Weston, Vt., Oct. 13, 1851, Lucy Morse (Walker) Dearborn, widow of Dr. Jesse Dearborn, and daughter of Rev. Nathaniel Clarke Alvord moved from Le Roy, N. Y., to Grosse Isle, Mich., about 1836, where he lived several years, afterwards he crossed the river to Trenton (then Truago) where he owned considerable property. He was always prominent in religious and educational work and was for several years president of the Trenton School Board. He organized the first Sunday School in Trenton and was instrumental in having the Protestant Church established there. Up to the time of his death he was senior warden of that church, and was for many years lay reader and superintendent of the Sunday school. He was a man of unimpeachable character and respected by all. By occupation he was a carpenter and farmer.
