In 1849 Volney Spalding was running a store in Palmyra, Mich., in company with his nephew, William Spalding. Eight months later they moved the business to Toledo, O. Mrs. Lorena (Alvord) Spalding is remembered as a high-spirited, beautiful woman with ruddy complexion, large brilliant black eyes and very black hair. She was a woman of high character, and lofty aims and ambitions. She was a victim of cholera, as was also her daughter, when it swept the city of Toledo. Mrs. Spalding resided later at Atlanta, Ga.

546. ARELIA ALVORD (*Joseph, Joseph, Joseph, Ebenezer, Alexander*), born Lewiston, N. Y.; died 1829; married Dec. 12, 1827, Erastus Holmes Spalding, son of Erastus and Jennet (Mack) Spalding. He was born Scipio, N. Y., Aug. 16, 1801; died Mar. 18, 1869. Res. Dowagiac, Mich. No children.

Erastus H. Spalding removed to Dowagiac, Mich., where he ran a flowering mill. He had children by a second wife, some of whom were residing at Dowagiac in 1869.

548. MARY ANN ALVORD (*Joseph, Joseph, Joseph, Ebenezer, Alexander*), born Lewiston, N. Y., Sept. 11, 1813; died Saratoga Springs, N. Y., July 6, 1841; married Lewiston, N. Y., Nov. 1833, Orrin Field, son of Peleg and Elizabeth (Battley) Field. He was born New Berlin, N. Y., Apr. 28, 1808; died New Berlin, N. Y., Nov. 7, 1872. Res. New Berlin, N. Y. Children:

- a. Edward George, b. New Berlin, N. Y., Aug. 27, 1834; killed by cars 1874; mar. Clara P. Snell, whose recollections of her grandmother Alvord have been of great interest. She married 2nd, E. P. Walton.
- b. Charles F., b. New Berlin, N. Y., July 6, 1836; d. Ft. Hamilton, N. Y., 1864, unkm. A soldier in Civil War from N. Y. State.
- c. Rushton Holmes, b. New Berlin, N. Y., May 6, 1838; living Ocean Springs, Miss., 1905; mar. Tiffin, O., Apr. 2, 1868, Mary Florence Myers.
- d. Joseph Alvord, b. New Berlin, N. Y., Aug. 5, 1840; d. Mo. Sept. 16, 1862; mar. in Mo., Almira Wallace, whose father was a secessionist. While Mr. Field was riding out of his father-in-law's yard he was shot dead by Union soldiers.

Mary (Alvord) Field, was two months old at the time of the massacre at Lewiston. The cloak in which she was wrapped by her mother in the flight is still in possession of her son Rushton H. Field.
