1687. FENN GEORGE ALVORD (*Martin, Charles, Thomas Gould, Asahel, Thomas, Thomas, Alexander*), born Homer, N. Y., July 20, 1834; married Scott, N. Y., Dec. 23, 1860, Mary Elizabeth Babcock, daughter of Justus and Keziah Orvis (Alvord) Babcock. She was born Scott, N. Y., Mar. 16, 1841. Res. Riverton, Iowa, 1904. Child:

Fenn George (George Fenn originally) Alvord is a farmer at Riverton, Iowa, where he settled in 1884. He was a soldier in the Civil War, enlisting Aug. 22, 1862, at Homer, N. Y., as a private in Co. D, 157th Reg. N. Y. Volunteers. He was mustered in Sept. 19, 1862, at Hamilton, N. Y. Prof. P. P. Brown of Hamilton College was the Colonel in command. The company was ordered immediately to Arlington Heights, Va., where they were assigned to the 11th Corps under Gen. Sickles in the Army of the Potomac commanded by Gen. McClellan. They marched to Fairfax Court House and went into camp. They were ordered forward double-quick, to guard Thoroughfare Gap, when Gen. McClellan started from Harpers Ferry south driving Gen. Lee before him. When Gen. McClellan was relieved of his command, they marched to Centerville and went into camp. Here Mr. Alvord was detailed to the Quartermaster's Department and soon after he was taken sick with inflammation of the lungs and went to the Field Hospital, until the regiment was ordered to Fredericksburg. After breaking camp he was sent to Washington Hospital in an ambulance. After the battle of Fredericksburg accommodations were needed for about five thousand wounded soldiers. Accordingly Mr. Alvord with others was moved from Washington Hospital to Bedloe's Island, Ft. Wood, N. Y. Harbor, where he had a relapse and was discharged Jan. 26, 1863. He lived the greater part of his life at Homer and Scott, N. Y.
