"John Joyell Bachelor of Devynetic of the vnyversitie of Oxforde and at this p'sent by the grace of god byshoppe of Sarum unto whome by Declara'ion of ancient letters patentes the Chauncellorshippe of the most noble order of the garter is incident as more playnly appeareth by the saide letters patent now in my registers recorded in this p'sent visitation made by me William Harveye al's Clarenceul's king of arms."

Extracted from the Visitation Book of the County of Wilts, made in the year 1565, now remaining in the College of arms, London, this 2d day of March, 1859.

**1 THOMAS JEWELL** was probably born in England, not far from the year 1600. We have been unable positively to connect him with any European family; but various circumstances coincide to render it most likely that he was from the same original stock as Bishop John Jewell, who was born in the north of Devonshire in 1522, and died in 1571.

The name has been written Jule, Joyell, Jewel, then Jewell.

The first authentic account of Thomas is in the early part of 1639, but little more than 18 years after the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth; and shows that he had then a wife and one child, probably a daughter. The Boston record is as follows:
