Jabez learned the machinist's trade. He was engaged in Colt's factory at Hartford, Conn., and went to England for that firm on business. At the outbreak of the Civil War he enlisted in the 28th Reg. of Conn. Volunteers as 2nd Lieut. This was the final contribution of Winchester men to the service and was a nine months' enlistment. It consisted of the Major of the regiment, a Captain, two Lieutenants and fifty-nine enlisted men. The regiment encamped at New Haven, Conn., until Nov. 18, 1862, when it embarked for Pensacola, Fla., and there remained inactive until ordered to join Gen. Banks' army. After harrassing marches in La. they were actively engaged in the assault on Port Hudson, Jan. 14, 1863, sustaining a loss of fifty-nine killed, wounded and missing. During the siege of Port Hudson, Lieut. Alvord sustained a severe illness under great privations. The regiment was mustered out of the service at New Haven, Conn., Aug. 28, 1863. After the war Mr. Alvord served as postmaster at Winsted, Conn., for two years and later engaged in manufacturing. He resides at Winsted, Conn.

James Hall Alvord settled in the part of East Hampton, Conn., called "Muddy Gutter Brook," but in 1809 he removed with his family, wife and three children, Clarissa Penfield, John Watson and
