- e. Caleb Alexander, b. Boston, Mass., Oct. 8, 1814; d. Chicago, Ill., Jan. 13, 1841. He was educated at the Boston Latin School and Harvard College (grad. 1834), after which he studied law with Henry H. Fuller of Boston and at the Dane Law School, Cambridge, Mass. He was among the first settlers of Geneva (La Fox), Kane Co., Ill.
- f. John Albert, b. Boston, Mass., Nov. 16, 1816; d. Newton, Mass., May 3, 1897; mar. Oct. 31, 1850, Georgianna Nichols. He was a Unitarian clergyman. S. T. B. 1839, Harvard, preached at Chicopee, Mass., San Francisco, Cal., Stockbridge, Mass., and Chestnut Hill, Mass.
- g. Charles Alfred, b. Boston, Mass., June 14, 1819; d. Boston, Mass., Aug. 27, 1819.
- h. Charles Edward, b. Boston, Mass., June 7, 1821; d. Boston, Mass., Feb. 19, 1877; mar. Sept. 23, 1847, Mary Elizabeth Marshall. A. B. 1840 Harvard; M. D. 1844 Harvard: He held the position of Prof. of the Theory and Practice of Medicine, Obstetrics and Medical Jurisprudence at Harvard Medical School.
- i. Francis William, b. Boston, Mass., Nov. 26, 1823; d. Chicago, Ill., Sept. 25, 1882; mar. June 30, 1847, Abby Shelden Beecher. He was a lawyer and real estate dealer.
- j. Ellen Mary, b. Boston, Mass., Jan. 29, 1827; d. Dec. 12, 1881; mar. Oct. 2, 1877, Charles W. Stone.
- k. Lucy Ann, b. Boston, Mass., Dec. 17, 1828; living at Clinton, Mass., 1905, unm.
- l. Lucius Henry, b. Boston, Mass., Dec. 9, 1829; d. Newton, Mass., May 29, 1885; mar. Nov. 24, 1858, Angelina Bradley Hyde. He was a teacher in Boston, A. B., 1851, Harvard, Ph. D., 1876, Harvard.
- m. Frederic Alexander, b. Boston, Mass., June 18, 1831; living at Rockford, Ill., 1905; mar. Nov. 28, 1867 Frances Helen Nash of Rockford, Ill. He was a member of the 2nd, Reg. Minn. Vols., during the Civil War. He was taken prisoner at Chickamauga, was in prison at several places and lastly at Richmond, Va., where he remained until within a few days of his discharge.

Mrs. Melinda (Alvord) Buckingham died after a long and painful illness and was buried at Mt. Auburn.

Mr. Buckingham in early life was apprenticed to the printer's trade, which was the great object of his young desire. He began at what was then a somewhat celebrated printing office in Walpole, N.
