William Brewster Alvord for two years after his marriage was engaged as clerk and book-keeper in the forwarding house of John Dows and Cary, Albany, N. Y. In 1829 he moved with his family to Cincinnati, O., and ten years later went into partnership with Lot Pugh in the pork packing business under the name, "Pugh and Alvord." The business prospered in spite of two very disastrous fires, the first occurring in 1842 and the second in 1845, in which eleven men lost their lives. Mr. Alvord, himself, was seriously injured. In 1853 he gave up his business in Cincinnati, and removed to Milwaukee, Wis., where he conducted a grain elevator for six years. Here again Mr. Alvord suffered loss from fire, his elevator burning in 1857. Two years later he moved to St. Louis, Mo.,
