Friend Edwin Alvord in 1861 enlisted in the 95th N. Y. Infantry for the Civil War, and was several times wounded in the service. In 1863 he was detailed as scout under Gen. Ed. McCook and was one of the six designated to cut Hood's Pontoon Bridge. He was captured and sentenced to be hanged at 6 o'clock at night on the same day at Cherokee, Ala. Mr. Alvord escaped by jumping out of the house, crawling along a rail fence to a woods and reaching the Union lines at Athens. He was wounded and captured again when the scouts of McCook were slain at Plantersville after which he was imprisoned at Andersonville. He was on the steamer Sultana at the time of the great explosion when 1600 out of 1950 were drowned. Mr. Alvord received his discharge July 17, 1865 by reason of disability and wounds.

Mr. Alvord went West after the war and lived in and around Jonesville, Mich., until 1885, when he removed to Crooked Creek, Ind., and from there to Gary, Cook Co., Ill. He has served as Marshall and Deputy Sheriff.

PUELLA CORNELIA ALVORD (*Erastus Bulis, David, Alexander, Obed, Asahel, Thomas, Thomas, Alexander*), born Jonesville, Mich., July 4, 1847; married Jonesville, Mich., Jan. 1, 1867, William Nathan Sparrow, son of Henry and Mary (Treadwell) Sparrow. He was born Narage, West Canada, July 1, 1846. Res. Harbor Springs, Mich., 1905. His occupation, farmer. Child:

LILLIAN AMELIA ALVORD (*Erastus Bulis, David, Alexander, Obed, Asahel, Thomas, Thomas, Alexander*), born Jonesville, Mich., Aug. 2, 1849; married Jonesville, Mich., Sept. 24, 1872, Edward Porter Willard, son of John H. and Eliza (Baldwin) Willard. He was born Alexandria, N. Y., July 22, 1842; died Petosky, Mich., Nov. 13, 1903. Res. Petosky, Mich., 1905. No children.

Edward P. Willard lived at Elkhart, Ind., for more than thirty years. For several years he was engaged in real estate business and was afterwards vice president and a director of the Elkhart National Bank. He also served as treasurer of the Citizens' Street Railway Co. and the Elkhart Electric Lighting Co., and was closely identified with nearly every public interest of the city.
