





President Wilson had a cold and had to stay at home, but there were other notables galore. The blue-clad middies, in their service coats, made a picture worth looking at.





The Young Soldiers amused themselves and annoyed the Navy goat by shooting a brass cannon whenever the opportunity offered.






stein, who blocked a kick and ran 25 yards for a score. © American Press
