






On the right—French poilu enjoying a moment's relaxation on the fire step of his front line trench. Note the overhead netting for shrapnel protection. Int. Film.





Above—A wrecked Boche aeroplane makes a splendid clotheshorse for this Canadian Tommy on the British front. Western Newspaper Union.
