



A.E.F. RIFLE AND PISTOL COMPETITION SCHEDULED FOR LE MANS, MAY 5 TO 24

Every division, unattached regiment, battalion, company and every other organization in the American Expeditionary Forces, whether attached and however employed, which is armed with either the rifle or pistol, will send its crack shots to compete in the rifle and pistol shoot to be held at Le Mans, May 5 to 24, for the championship of the A.E.F.

Preliminary shoots are being speedily organized where they are not actually under way, throughout the A.E.F. From the base ports to the Rhine every officer and soldier in the Expeditionary Forces is being urged to make the most of his opportunities to polish up his trigger squeeze, in an effort to gain a place among the entries.

The rifle course will be the same as the qualification course laid down in the Small Arms Firing Manual, and will comprise the following courses:

Either the 1903 or 1917 models of the Army service rifle may be used at the competition. Contests for Organizations or individuals not equipped with the model of rifle desired may arrange through the division ordnance officer for the exchange.

By elimination in the trial heats one soldier from each infantry company in the A.E.F., and one from each engineer company and each troop of cavalry will be selected to compete in the big match. Other units armed with the rifle may send one soldier for each 200 men armed with the rifle. Competing officers are restricted to two from each regiment, one from each company and one from each engineer regiment. One officer may be sent from each army corps and division headquarters and from each other unit armed with the rifle, to the proportion

Hal Hustenham, southpaw pitcher, formerly of the New York Giants and now of the Cincinnati Reds; Charles Jackson, outfielder of the Pittsburgh Nationals, and Glenn Thieman, formerly of the Chicago White Sox and now with the Minnesota Twins.

Company baseball teams are already organized, others are under way, and in not a few instances the cracks of the bat and the cries of "Home," "Home," etc., are echoing and re-echoing from the hills and cliffs that rise up majestically along the Rhine to the river.

"THE RHINE, THE RHINE, THE YANKEE RHINE"

"If you get a chance to go to Vienna, cut all you can before starting, fill all your available baggage with rations, and then decide not to go," is the opinion given by Lt. Lieut. J. Sutton, of the Photographic Unit of the Signal Corps, who recently returned from a trip through Germany and Austria, which started January 1.

Lieutenant Sutton was accompanied on his picture-taking expedition by Sergeant McAuley, Private Suss and Private Hasler, but they were obliged to remain in Vienna, owing to a shortage in finances brought about by high food prices.

Having something to kick about is not a natural prerogative of a prisoner, but captured Russians have been known to kick about the prison pens of Germany. Two carloads of equipment sent under convoy from Cologne to Berlin by the Y.M.C.A., included, besides the usual food, clothing, picture machines, tobacco, literature and various other commodities calculated to

cheer away the hours of the Yanks in the heart of Hunland. The two cars, the first to go direct from Coblenz to Berlin, were consigned to the American Commission in the Prussian capital, which boasts of a military postoffice of its own just like any other center in the A.E.F. The train was under guard of American soldiers all the way.

A group of men were standing on the aviation field across the Moselle from Trier when a Liberty plane suddenly appeared above them, hurtled earthward and crashed to pieces in the dirt. The men rushed to the wreckage with little hope of finding even the semblance of a human being beneath it.

Four kilometers from Trier is a huge airfield, formerly occupied and operated by the Germans, now the home of the 9th, 50th and 160th Aero Squadrons, which are assigned to the Seventh Corps. Here one flying machine is utilized exclusively for the pleasure and edification of visitors because of the absence of the customary striped pole, are flourishing and always crowded.

of the standard type observation planes are placed at their disposal. There is always a waiting list about a kilometer long of Germans who are frequently eager to grab off a job of some sort in the Third Army salvage plant at Coblenz. "Litzel, Why? Rations. Under provisions of the ruling which permits the rationing of Germans working on the railroads for Americans, Germans employed in the salvage factory—of whom there are about 400—are also entitled to draw a specific ration for each eight hours of labor. They get sugar, coffee, flour, goldfish, corned beef and fresh roast beef—and if any one is late for work in the morning he or she loses that day's ration. The beneficiaries are mostly women whose husbands or other dependents were killed in the war. No one is ever late.

There is another innovation at the salvage plant, namely, an officers' school for the proper fitting of shoes. Forty officers come in for a five weeks' course. They gather round a big square platform on which stand Yanks in need of good understanding, and otherwise see to it that the enlisted man's provided with a shoe that fits him properly. The purpose of the course is to show each officer the necessity for good, comfortable shoes for his men.

YOUNG NEAR-HERO FOOLED THEM ALL

Boy Munchausen Loses His Reputation But Gains Passage Home

Harry Skinner, 15 years old, is a boy after Mark Twain's own heart. He has always kept one lap ahead of Truth, who has been following up his trail as the boy wonder mascot of Co. G, 102nd Infantry. This week when Truth thought she had trapped Harry in the embarkation port of Brest, Harry was some where on the Atlantic ocean on his way to the United States.

Harry for months and months was the authentic and original Lusitania waif. The tale he told to the men of Co. G when he appeared among them unaccountably one day up near Chateau-Thierry had all the thrills of the old rumbunctious literature of boyhood, with all its settings strictly modern and dovetailing with history of the Great War. He described his home in Springfield, Ohio. He told of the day when the Lusitania was sunk. He was on her. So were his parents. He was saved. They were not. There were other chapters—one in which the young hero was captured by the Germans, spent weeks in German prison camps, and finally escaped by way of Switzerland. All the time, however, Truth was on Harry's trail. But Co. G moved too fast.
